## GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The 128MByte (1Gb) DDR SDRAM is a high-speed CMOS, dynamic random-access, memory using 5 chips containing 268,435,456 bits. Each chip is internally configured as a quad-bank DRAM. Each of the chip's 67,108,864-bit banks is organized as 8,192 rows by 512 columns by 16 bits.

The 128 MB DDR SDRAM uses a double data rate architecture to achieve high-speed operation. The double data rate architecture is essentially a 2n-prefetch architecture with an interface designed to transfer two data words per clock cycle at the I/O pins. A single read or write access for the 128MB DDR SDRAM effectively consists of a single 2n-bit wide, one-clock-cycle data transfer at the internal DRAM core and two corresponding n-bit wide, one-half-clock-cycle data transfers at the I/O pins.


A bidirectional data strobe (DQS) is transmitted externally, along with data, for use in data capture at the receiver. DQS is a

FIG. 1 PIN CONFIGURATION



strobe transmitted by the DDR SDRAM during READs and by the memory controller during WRITEs. DQS is edge-aligned with data for READs and center-aligned with data for WRITEs. Each chip has two data strobes, one for the lower byte and one for the upper byte.

The 128MB DDR SDRAM operates from a differential clock (CLK and  $\overline{\text{CLK}}$ ); the crossing of CLK going HIGH and  $\overline{\text{CLK}}$  going LOW will be referred to as the positive edge of CLK. Commands (address and control signals) are registered at every positive edge of CLK. Input data is registered on both edges of DQS, and output data is referenced to both edges of DQS, as well as to both edges of CLK.

Read and write accesses to the DDR SDRAM are burst oriented; accesses start at a selected location and continue for a programmed number of locations in a programmed sequence. Accesses begin with the registration of an ACTIVE command, which is then followed by a READ or WRITE command. The address bits registered coincident with the ACTIVE command are used to select the bank and row to be accessed. The address bits registered coincident with the READ or WRITE command are used to select the bank and the starting column location for the burst access.

The DDR SDRAM provides for programmable READ or WRITE burst lengths of 2, 4, or 8 locations. An auto precharge function may be enabled to provide a self-timed row precharge that is initiated at the end of the burst access.

The pipelined, multibank architecture of DDR SDRAMs allows for concurrent operation, thereby providing high effective bandwidth by hiding row precharge and activation time.

An auto refresh mode is provided, along with a power-saving power-down mode.

## FUNCTIONAL DESCRIPTION

Read and write accesses to the DDR SDRAM are burst oriented; accesses start at a selected location and continue for a programmed number of locations in a programmed sequence. Accesses begin with the registration of an ACTIVE command which is then followed by a READ or WRITE command. The address bits registered coincident with the ACTIVE command are used to select the bank and row to be accessed (BA0 and BA1 select the bank, A0-12 select the row). The address bits registered coincident with the READ or WRITE command are used to select the starting column location for the burst access.

Prior to normal operation, the SDRAM must be initialized. The following sections provide detailed information cover-

ing device initialization, register definition, command descriptions and device operation.

## INITIALIZATION

DDR SDRAMs must be powered up and initialized in a pre-defined manner. Operational procedures other than those specified may result in undefined operation. Power must first be applied to Vcc and Vcco simultaneously, and then to VREF (and to the system VTT). VTT must be applied after Vcco to avoid device latch-up, which may cause permanent damage to the device. VREF can be applied any time after Vcco but is expected to be nominally coincident with VTT. Except for CKE, inputs are not recognized as valid until after VREF is applied. CKE is an SSTL\_2 input but will detect an LVCMOS LOW level after Vcc is applied. Maintaining an LVCMOS LOW level on CKE during power-up is required to ensure that the DQ and DQS outputs will be in the High-Z state, where they will remain until driven in normal operation (by a read access). After all power supply and reference voltages are stable, and the clock is stable, the DDR SDRAM requires a 200 $\mu$ s delay prior to applying an executable command.

Once the 200 $\mu$ s delay has been satisfied, a Deselect or NOP command should be applied, and CKE should be brought HIGH. Following the NOP command, a PRECHARGE ALL command should be applied. Next a LOAD MODE REGISTER command should be issued for the extended mode register (BA1 LOW and BA0 HIGH) to enable the DLL, followed by another LOAD MODE REGISTER command to the mode register (BA0/BA1 both LOW) to reset the DLL and to program the operating parameters. Two-hundred clock cycles are required between the DLL reset and any READ command. A PRECHARGE ALL command should then be applied, placing the device in the all banks idle state.

Once in the idle state, two AUTO REFRESH cycles must be performed (trfc must be satisfied.) Additionally, a LOAD MODE REGISTER command for the mode register with the reset DLL bit deactivated (i.e., to program operating parameters without resetting the DLL) is required. Following these requirements, the DDR SDRAM is ready for normal operation.

## REGISTER DEFINITION

### MODE REGISTER

The Mode Register is used to define the specific mode of operation of the DDR SDRAM. This definition includes the



selection of a burst length, a burst type, a CAS latency, and an operating mode, as shown in Figure 3. The Mode Register is programmed via the MODE REGISTER SET command (with BA0 = 0 and BA1 = 0) and will retain the stored information until it is programmed again or the device loses power. (Except for bit A8 which is self clearing).

Reprogramming the mode register will not alter the contents of the memory, provided it is performed correctly. The Mode Register must be loaded (reloaded) when all banks are idle and no bursts are in progress, and the controller must wait the specified time before initiating the subsequent operation. Violating either of these requirements will result in unspecified operation.

Mode register bits A0-A2 specify the burst length, A3 specifies the type of burst (sequential or interleaved), A4-A6 specify the CAS latency, and A7-A12 specify the operating mode.

### BURST LENGTH

Read and write accesses to the DDR SDRAM are burst oriented, with the burst length being programmable, as shown in Figure 3. The burst length determines the maximum number of column locations that can be accessed for a given READ or WRITE command. Burst lengths of 2, 4 or 8 locations are available for both the sequential and the interleaved burst types.

Reserved states should not be used, as unknown operation or incompatibility with future versions may result.

When a READ or WRITE command is issued, a block of columns equal to the burst length is effectively selected. All accesses for that burst take place within this block, meaning that the burst will wrap within the block if a boundary is reached. The block is uniquely selected by A1-Ai when the burst length is set to two; by A2-Ai when the burst length is set to four (where Ai is the most significant column address for a given configuration); and by A3-Ai when the burst length is set to eight. The remaining (least significant) address bit(s) is (are) used to select the starting location within the block. The programmed burst length applies to both READ and WRITE bursts.

### BURST TYPE

Accesses within a given burst may be programmed to be either sequential or interleaved; this is referred to as the burst type and is selected via bit M3.

The ordering of accesses within a burst is determined by the burst length, the burst type and the starting column address, as shown in Table 1.

### READ LATENCY

The READ latency is the delay, in clock cycles, between the registration of a READ command and the availability of the first bit of output data. The latency can be set to 2 or 2.5 clocks.

If a READ command is registered at clock edge *n*, and the latency is *m* clocks, the data will be available by clock edge *n + m*. Table 2 below indicates the operating frequencies at which each CAS latency setting can be used.

Reserved states should not be used as unknown operation or incompatibility with future versions may result.

### OPERATING MODE

The normal operating mode is selected by issuing a MODE REGISTER SET command with bits A7-A12 each set to zero, and bits A0-A6 set to the desired values. A DLL reset is initiated by issuing a MODE REGISTER SET command with bits A7 and A9-A12 each set to zero, bit A8 set to one, and bits A0-A6 set to the desired values. Although not required, JEDEC specifications recommend when a LOAD MODE REGISTER command is issued to reset the DLL, it should always be followed by a LOAD MODE REGISTER command to select normal operating mode.

All other combinations of values for A7-A12 are reserved for future use and/or test modes. Test modes and reserved states should not be used because unknown operation or incompatibility with future versions may result.



FIG. 3 MODE REGISTER DEFINITION



NOTES:

1. For a burst length of two, A1-Ai select two-data-element block; A0 selects the starting column within the block.
2. For a burst length of four, A2-Ai select four-data-element block; A0-1 select the starting column within the block.
3. For a burst length of eight, A3-Ai select eight-data-element block; A0-2 select the starting column within the block.
4. Whenever a boundary of the block is reached within a given sequence above, the following access wraps within the block.

EXTENDED MODE REGISTER





FIG. 5 EXTENDED MODE REGISTER DEFINITION

The extended mode register controls functions beyond those controlled by the mode register; these additional functions are DLL enable/disable, output drive strength, and QFC. These functions are controlled via the bits shown in Figure 5. The extended mode register is programmed via the LOAD MODE REGISTER command to the mode register (with BA0 = 1 and BA1 = 0) and will retain the stored information until it is programmed again or the device loses power. The enabling of the DLL should always be followed by a LOAD MODE REGISTER command to the mode register (BA0/BA1 both LOW) to reset the DLL.

The extended mode register must be loaded when all banks are idle and no bursts are in progress, and the controller must wait the specified time before initiating any subsequent operation. Violating either of these requirements could result in unspecified operation.



FIG. 4 CAS LATENCY

## OUTPUT DRIVE STRENGTH

The normal full drive strength for all outputs are specified to be SSTL2, Class II. The DDR SDRAM supports an option for reduced drive. This option is intended for the support of the lighter load and/or point-to-point environments. The selection of the reduced drive strength will alter the DQs and DQSs from SSTL2, Class II drive strength to a reduced drive strength, which is approximately 54 percent of the SSTL2, Class II drive strength.

## DLL ENABLE/DISABLE

The DLL must be enabled for normal operation. DLL enable is required during power-up initialization and upon returning to normal operation after having disabled the DLL for the purpose of debug or evaluation. (When the device exits self refresh mode, the DLL is enabled automatically.) Any time the DLL is enabled, 200 clock cycles must occur before a READ command can be issued.

## COMMANDS

The Truth Table provides a quick reference of available commands. This is followed by a written description of each command.

## DESELECT

The Deselect function ( $\overline{CS}$  HIGH) prevents new commands from being executed by the DDR SDRAM. The SDRAM is effectively deselected. Operations already in progress are not affected.

## NO OPERATION (NOP)

The NO OPERATION (NOP) command is used to perform a NOP to the selected DDR SDRAM ( $\overline{CS}$  is LOW). This prevents unwanted commands from being registered during idle or wait states. Operations already in progress are not affected.

## LOAD MODE REGISTER

The Mode Registers are loaded via inputs A0-12. The LOAD MODE REGISTER command can only be issued when all banks are idle, and a subsequent executable command cannot be issued until tMRD is met.

**NOTES:**

1. CKE is HIGH for all commands shown except SELF REFRESH.
2. A0-12 define the op-code to be written to the selected Mode Register. BA0, BA1 select either the mode register (0, 0) or the extended mode register (1, 0).
3. A0-12 provide row address, and BA0, BA1 provide bank address.
4. A0-8 provide column address; A10 HIGH enables the auto precharge feature (non persistent), while A10 LOW disables the auto precharge feature; BA0, BA1 provide bank address.
5. A10 LOW; BA0, BA1 determine the bank being precharged. A10 HIGH: All banks precharged and BA0, BA1 are "Don't Care."
6. This command is AUTO REFRESH if CKE is HIGH; SELF REFRESH if CKE is LOW.
7. Internal refresh counter controls row addressing; all inputs and I/Os are "Don't Care" except for CKE.
8. Applies only to read bursts with auto precharge disabled; this command is undefined (and should not be used) for READ bursts with auto precharge enabled and for WRITE bursts.
9. Deselect and NOP are functionally interchangeable.
10. Used to mask write data; provided coincident with the corresponding data.

**ACTIVE**

The ACTIVE command is used to open (or activate) a row in a particular bank for a subsequent access. The value on the BA0, BA1 inputs selects the bank, and the address provided on inputs A0-12 selects the row. This row remains active (or open) for accesses until a PRECHARGE command is issued to that bank. A PRECHARGE command must be issued before opening a different row in the same bank.

**READ**

The READ command is used to initiate a burst read access to an active row. The value on the BA0, BA1 inputs selects the bank, and the address provided on inputs A0-8 selects the starting column location. The value on input A10 determines whether or not AUTO PRECHARGE is used. If AUTO PRECHARGE is selected, the row being accessed will be precharged at the end of the READ burst; if AUTO

PRECHARGE is not selected, the row will remain open for subsequent accesses.

**WRITE**

The WRITE command is used to initiate a burst write access to an active row. The value on the BA0, BA1 inputs selects the bank, and the address provided on inputs A0-8 selects the starting column location. The value on input A10 determines whether or not AUTO PRECHARGE is used. If AUTO PRECHARGE is selected, the row being accessed will be precharged at the end of the WRITE burst; if AUTO PRECHARGE is not selected, the row will remain open for subsequent accesses. Input data appearing on the D/Qs is written to the memory array subject to the DQM input logic level appearing coincident with the data. If a given DQM signal is registered LOW, the corresponding data will be written to memory; if the DQM signal is registered HIGH, the corresponding data inputs will be ignored, and a WRITE will not be executed to that byte/column location.



## PRECHARGE

The PRECHARGE command is used to deactivate the open row in a particular bank or the open row in all banks. The bank(s) will be available for a subsequent row access a specified time ( $t_{RP}$ ) after the PRECHARGE command is issued. Except in the case of concurrent auto precharge, where a READ or WRITE command to a different bank is allowed as long as it does not interrupt the data transfer in the current bank and does not violate any other timing parameters. Input A10 determines whether one or all banks are to be precharged, and in the case where only one bank is to be precharged, inputs BA0, BA1 select the bank. Otherwise BA0, BA1 are treated as "Don't Care." Once a bank has been precharged, it is in the idle state and must be activated prior to any READ or WRITE commands being issued to that bank. A PRECHARGE command will be treated as a NOP if there is no open row in that bank (idle state), or if the previously open row is already in the process of precharging.

## AUTO PRECHARGE

AUTO PRECHARGE is a feature which performs the same individual-bank PRECHARGE function described above, but without requiring an explicit command. This is accomplished by using A10 to enable AUTO PRECHARGE in conjunction with a specific READ or WRITE command. A precharge of the bank/row that is addressed with the READ or WRITE command is automatically performed upon completion of the READ or WRITE burst. AUTO PRECHARGE is nonpersistent in that it is either enabled or disabled for each individual READ or WRITE command. The device supports concurrent auto precharge if the command to the other bank does not interrupt the data transfer to the current bank.

AUTO PRECHARGE ensures that the precharge is initiated at the earliest valid stage within a burst. This "earliest valid stage" is determined as if an explicit precharge command was issued at the earliest possible time, without violating  $t_{RAS}$  (MIN). The user must not issue another command to the same bank until the precharge time ( $t_{RP}$ ) is completed. This is determined as if an explicit PRECHARGE command was issued at the earliest possible time, without violating  $t_{RAS}$  (MIN).

## BURST TERMINATE

The BURST TERMINATE command is used to truncate READ bursts (with auto precharge disabled). The most recently registered READ command prior to the BURST TERMINATE command will be truncated. The open page which the READ burst was terminated from remains open.

## AUTO REFRESH

AUTO REFRESH is used during normal operation of the DDR SDRAM and is analogous to CAS-BEFORE-RAS (CBR) REFRESH in conventional DRAMs. This command is nonpersistent, so it must be issued each time a refresh is required.

The addressing is generated by the internal refresh controller. This makes the address bits "Don't Care" during an AUTO REFRESH command. Each DDR SDRAM requires AUTO REFRESH cycles at an average interval of  $7.8125\mu s$  (maximum).

To allow for improved efficiency in scheduling and switching between tasks, some flexibility in the absolute refresh interval is provided. A maximum of eight AUTO REFRESH commands can be posted to any given DDR SDRAM, meaning that the maximum absolute interval between any AUTO REFRESH command and the next AUTO REFRESH command is  $9 \times 7.8125\mu s$  ( $70.3\mu s$ ). This maximum absolute interval is to allow future support for DLL updates internal to the DDR SDRAM to be restricted to AUTO REFRESH cycles, without allowing excessive drift in  $t_{AC}$  between updates.

Although not a JEDEC requirement, to provide for future functionality features, CKE must be active (High) during the AUTO REFRESH period. The AUTO REFRESH period begins when the AUTO REFRESH command is registered and ends  $t_{RFC}$  later.

## SELF REFRESH\*

The SELF REFRESH command can be used to retain data in the DDR SDRAM, even if the rest of the system is powered down. When in the self refresh mode, the DDR SDRAM retains data without external clocking. The SELF REFRESH command is initiated like an AUTO REFRESH command except CKE is disabled (LOW). The DLL is automatically disabled upon entering SELF REFRESH and is automatically enabled upon exiting SELF REFRESH (200 clock cycles must then occur before a READ command can be issued). Input signals except CKE are "Don't Care" during SELF REFRESH.

The procedure for exiting self refresh requires a sequence of commands. First, CLK must be stable prior to CKE going back HIGH. Once CKE is HIGH, the DDR SDRAM must have NOP commands issued for  $t_{XSNR}$ , because time is required for the completion of any internal refresh in progress.

A simple algorithm for meeting both refresh and DLL requirements is to apply NOPs for 200 clock cycles before applying any other command.





2. Tests for AC timing,  $I_{CC}$ , and electrical AC and DC characteristics may be conducted at nominal reference/supply voltage levels, but the related specifications and device operation are guaranteed for the full voltage range specified.


4. AC timing and  $I_{CC}$  tests may use a  $V_{IL}$ -to- $V_{IH}$  swing of up to 1.5V in the test environment, but input timing is still referenced to  $V_{REF}$  (or to the crossing point for  $CLK/\overline{CLK}$ ), and parameter specifications are guaranteed for the specified AC input levels under normal use conditions. The minimum slew rate for the input signals used to test the device is 1V/ns in the range between  $V_{IL}(AC)$  and  $V_{IH}(AC)$ .
5. The AC and DC input level specifications are as defined in the SSTL\_2 Standard (i.e., the receiver will effectively switch as a result of the signal crossing the AC input level, and will remain in that state as long as the signal does not ring back above [below] the DC input LOW [HIGH] level).
6.  $V_{REF}$  is expected to equal  $V_{CC0}/2$  of the transmitting device and to track variations in the DC level of the same. Peak-to-peak noise (noncommon mode) on  $V_{REF}$  may not exceed  $\pm 2$  percent of the DC value. 8.  $V_{ID}$  is the magnitude of the difference between the input level on  $CLK$  and the input level on  $\overline{CLK}$ .
9. The value of  $V_{IX}$  and  $V_{MP}$  are expected to equal  $V_{CC0}/2$  of the transmitting device and must track variations in the DC level of the same.
10.  $I_{CC}$  is dependent on output loading and cycle rates. Specified values are obtained with minimum cycle time with the outputs open.
11. Enables on-chip refresh and address counters.
12.  $I_{CC}$  specifications are tested after the device is properly initialized, and is averaged at the defined cycle rate.
13. This parameter is not tested but guaranteed by design.  $T_A = 25^\circ C$ ,  $F = 1 MHz$

14. Command/Address input slew rate = 0.5V/ns. For 266 MHz with slew rates 1V/ns and faster,  $t_{IS}$  and  $t_{IH}$  are reduced to 900ps. If the slew rate is less than 0.5V/ns, timing must be derated:  $t_{IS}$  has an additional 50ps per each 100mV/ns reduction in slew rate from the 500mV/ns.  $t_{IH}$  has 0ps added, that is, it remains constant. If the slew rate exceeds 4.5V/ns, functionality is uncertain.

- 28. To maintain a valid level, the transitioning edge of the input must:
  - a) Sustain a constant slew rate from the current AC level through to the target AC level,  $V_L(AC)$  or  $V_H(AC)$ .
  - b) Reach at least the target AC level.
  - c) After the AC target level is reached, continue to maintain at least the target DC level,  $V_L(DC)$  or  $V_H(DC)$ .
- 29. The input capacitance per pin group will not differ by more than this maximum amount for any given device.
- 30. CLK and  $\overline{CLK}$  input slew rate must be  $\geq 1V/ns$  ( $\geq 2V/ns$  differentially).
- 31. DQ and DM input slew rates must not deviate from DQS by more than 10%. If the DQ/DM/DQS slew rate is less than 0.5V/ns, timing must be derated: 50ps must be added to  $t_{DS}$  and  $t_{DH}$  for each 100mV/ns reduction in slew rate. If slow rate exceeds 4V/ns, functionality is uncertain.
- 32.  $V_{CC}$  must not vary more than 4% if CKE is not active while any bank is active.
- 33. The clock is allowed up to  $\pm 150ps$  of jitter. Each timing parameter is allowed to vary by the same amount.
- 34.  $t_{HP\ min}$  is the lesser of  $t_{CL}$  minimum and  $t_{CH}$  minimum actually applied to the device CLK and  $\overline{CLK}$  inputs, collectively during bank active.
- 35. READS and WRITES with auto precharge are not allowed to be issued until  $t_{RAS}(MIN)$  can be satisfied prior to the internal precharge command being issued.
- 36. Any positive glitch must be less than 1/3 of the clock and not more than +400mV or 2.9 volts, whichever is less. Any negative glitch must be less than 1/3 of the clock cycle and not exceed either -300mV or 2.2 volts, whichever is more positive.
- 37. Normal Output Drive Curves:
  - a) The full variation in driver pull-down current from minimum to maximum process, temperature and voltage will lie within the outer bounding lines of the V-I curve of Figure A.
  - b) The variation in driver pull-down current within nominal limits of voltage and temperature is expected, but not guaranteed, to lie within the inner bounding lines of the V-I curve of Figure A.
  - c) The full variation in driver pull-up current from minimum to maximum process, temperature and voltage will lie within the outer bounding lines of the V-I curve of Figure B.
  - d) The variation in driver pull-up current within nominal limits of voltage and temperature is expected, but not guaranteed, to lie within the inner bounding lines of the V-I curve of Figure B.
  - e) The full variation in the ratio of the maximum to minimum pull-up and pull-down current should be between .71 and 1.4, for device drain-to-source voltages from 0.1V to 1.0 Volt, and at the same voltage and temperature.
  - f) The full variation in the ratio of the nominal pull-up to pull-down current should be unity  $\pm 10\%$ , for device drain-to-source voltages from 0.1V to 1.0 Volt.
- 38. Reduced Output Drive Curves:
  - a) The full variation in driver pull-down current from minimum to maximum process, temperature and voltage will lie within the outer bounding lines of the V-I curve of Figure C.

- b) The variation in driver pull-down current within nominal limits of voltage and temperature is expected, but not guaranteed, to lie within the inner bounding lines of the V-I curve of Figure C.
- c) The full variation in driver pull-up current from minimum to maximum process, temperature and voltage will lie within the outer bounding lines of the V-I curve of Figure D.
- d) The variation in driver pull-up current within nominal limits of voltage and temperature is expected, but not guaranteed, to lie within the inner bounding lines of the V-I curve of Figure D.
- e) The full variation in the ratio of the maximum to minimum pull-up and pull-down current should be between .71 and 1.4, for device drain-to-source voltages from 0.1V to 1.0 V, and at the same voltage and temperature.
- f) The full variation in the ratio of the nominal pull-up to pull-down current should be unity  $\pm 10\%$ , for device drain-to-source voltages from 0.1V to 1.0 V.
- 39. The voltage levels used are derived from a minimum  $V_{CC}$  level and the referenced test load. In practice, the voltage levels obtained from a properly terminated bus will provide significantly different voltage values.
- 40.  $V_{IH}$  overshoot:  $V_{IH}(MAX) = V_{CC0} + 1.5V$  for a pulse width  $\leq 3ns$  and the pulse width can not be greater than 1/3 of the cycle rate.
- 41.  $V_{CC}$  and  $V_{CC0}$  must track each other.
- 42. This maximum value is derived from the referenced test load. In practice, the values obtained in a typical terminated design may reflect up to 310ps less for  $t_{HZ}(MAX)$  and the last DVW.  $t_{HZ}(MAX)$  will prevail over  $t_{BOSCK}(MAX) + t_{RPST}(MAX)$  condition.  $t_{LZ}(MIN)$  will prevail over  $t_{BOSCK}(MIN) + t_{TRPRE}(MAX)$  condition.
- 43. For slew rates greater than 1V/ns the (LZ) transition will start about 310ps earlier.
- 44. During initialization,  $V_{CC0}$ ,  $V_{TT}$ , and  $V_{REF}$  must be equal to or less than  $V_{CC} + 0.3V$ . Alternatively,  $V_{TT}$  may be 1.35V maximum during power up, even if  $V_{CC}/V_{CC0}$  are 0 volts, provided a minimum of 42 ohms of series resistance is used between the  $V_{TT}$  supply and the input pin.
- 45. The current part operates below the slowest JEDEC operating frequency of 83 MHz. As such, future die may not reflect this option.
- 46. Reserved for future use.
- 47. Reserved for future use.
- 48. Random addressing changing 50% of data changing at every transfer.
- 49. Random addressing changing 100% of data changing at every transfer.
- 50. CKE must be active (high) during the entire time a refresh command is executed. That is, from the time the AUTO REFRESH command is registered, CKE must be active at each rising clock edge, until tRFC has been satisfied.
- 51. ICC2N specifies the DQ, DQS, and DM to be driven to a valid high or low logic level. ICC2Q is similar to ICC2F except ICC2Q specifies the address and control inputs to remain stable. Although ICC2F, ICC2N, and ICC2Q are similar, ICC2F is "worst case."
- 52. Whenever the operating frequency is altered, not including jitter, the DLL is required to be reset. This is followed by 200 clock cycles before any READ command.

FIG. C PULL-DOWN CHARACTERISTICS






FIG. D PULL-UP CHARACTERISTICS






